Once again it is time to send greetings to the 558 members of the Roger Williams Family Association. I am sorry that so many members live too far away to be able to attend our meetings at the John Brown House, the home of the R. I. Historical Society, at 52 Power Street, Providence, R. I. There are two books in the library there, one, "Queries of Highest Consideration", by Roger Williams, which comprises his first clear-cut enunciation of the separation of Church and State. It is an exceedingly rare book. The only other known copies of this first edition are in the British Museum and the John Carter Brown Library. Of interest to Rhode Islanders is the fact that it was a product of the press of Gregory Dexter, founder of the famous Dexter Family which showered so many philanthropies on our community. The other book, by Roger Williams, printed in London in February 1652, entitled "The Hireling Ministry None of Christ's" was part of a campaign to persuade Cromwell and Parliament to abolish the payment of tithes for support of the clergy and thus establish freedom of religion as an economic fact. These books were presented to the R. I. Historical Society as a part of the observance of the American Jewish Tercentenary in 1954.

In the House Chambers of the R. I. State House, in Providence, at the top of the center panels of tapestry, is a shield depicting the landing of Roger Williams as he is greeted by the Indians. Another similar shield shows "Hope" kneeling, with the word "Hope" and an anchor at her side. Both shields have wreaths of roses around them. Until a recent cleaning, they were not visible from the floor.

During the past year three Church windows depicting Roger Williams have been dedicated as memorials. The first is in the First Baptist Church in Washington, D. C., and was given by Senator Theodore Francis Green of R. I. The second is in Phillips Memorial Baptist Church in Cranston, R. I. and was given by the Roe, Anthony, Wilbur, Eva and Harold Williams families. The third, the gift of Dr. William Howe Tolman is in the Pawtucket Congregational Church, Pawtucket, R. I. Our Association keeps a record of all known memorials. If you know of any other Roger Williams windows, statues or plaques that have been given during the past ten years, will you kindly let us know about them?

It has the straight-backed uncomfortable pews of the period, the men and women being separated, and the slaves and Indians relegated to the gallery. A visit to the iron mine nearby concluded the day's program.
