SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 17, 2005 - 10:45 AM

Blackstone River Boat Trip

We will meet at the boat dock on the Blackstone River at Market Square in Woonsocket, Rhode Island, for an hour and a half boat trip on the river. The fare will be \$10.00 per person. Directions: From 1-95 north in Providence, take 146 north about 12 miles to intersection with 146A. Bear left and proceed on 146A to 104 north (about 1/2 mile). Right on 104 to S. Main Street to Market Square. Boat dock is on left next to Annex Diner. Municipal parking lot is across from boat dock.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 15, 2005 - 11:00 AM

Tour of Clouds Hill Victorian House Museum

Members and guests will experience the elegance of another age when we meet at Clouds Hill Victorian House Museum at 4157 Post Road, Warwick, Rhode Island. The house was built by William Smith Slater of Slatersville, RI, nephew of Samuel Slater, founder of Slater Mill, for his daughter, Elizabeth Ives Slater, as a wedding present. Directions: Route 95 to Exit 10, 117 East, Warwick. Pass three lights. At the next light, turn right onto Post Road (Route I South). Pass through one blinking light and two more lights (approximately 1.3 miles). Turn right into the drive, across from Kimberly Village sign. If you pass the Mobil gas station on your left, you have gone too far.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 19, 2005 - 11:00 AM

Tour of Maxwell House

We will tour the Maxwell House, located on the corner of Church and Water Streets in Warren, Rhode Island. This brick Colonial house was the home of James and Level Maxwell, prominent ship owners and merchants. The house is now owned by the Massasoit Historical Society. The tour is \$2.00 per person. Directions: From Providence take I-195 east to Exit 7 (Rte 114 to Seekonk and Barrington). Bear right onto 114 South and follow through the town of Barrington into Warren. After the junction of Route 103, turn right onto Church Street and proceed to the corner of Church and Water Streets. To get to the India Restaurant, return to North Main Street, via Baker Street. Turn right on North Main Street, then next left onto Joyce Street. Turn immediately right into parking lot at rear of restaurant.

SATURDAY, MARCH 18, 2006 - 1:00 PM

Presentation by Lt. John Currier of the Pawtuxet Rangers

We will meet at East Greenwich Public Library at 82 Peirce Street, East Greenwich, Rhode Island for a presentation by Lt. John Currier on American Civil War General George Sears Greene, who was born in Apponaug Village in the city of Warwick, Rhode Island. General Greene was the oldest general on either side of the conflict. He is remembered for his bravery at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, and led the 3rd Brigade of New Yorkers on Culp's Hill the second day at battle of Gettysburg.

Directions: From Providence, take Route 95 South to Route 4 exit. Take first exit on Route 4 (East Greenwich exit). Bear right at the end of the ramp onto Division Street. Bear left at the fork in the road to continue on Division Street. Travel approximately 8/10 of a mile. Turn right onto Peirce Street. The Library is located 3 blocks down on the left, across from St. Luke's Episcopal Church.

SATURDAY, APRIL 22, 2006 - 10:45 AM

Tour of Slater Mill Historic Site

We will meet for a tour of the Slater Mill Historic Site at 67 Roosevelt Avenue, Pawtucket, Rhode Island. The presentation includes a tour of the Slater Mill, built in 1793, an 18th Century worker's cottage, the Wilkinson Mill, built in 1810, and a video presentation "Hidden on the Blackstone." Charge for the tour is \$7.50. There is an area where we may enjoy a picnic lunch and have a business meeting.

Directions: From the south, take I-95 North from Providence to Exit 28 (School St.). Left at bottom of ramp. Go through light, down hill, bear right across the river and turn right on Roosevelt Ave. Slater Mill is on the right. From north of Pawtucket, take I-95 South to Exit 29 (Downtown Pawtucket). Turn right at second stop sign on Broadway, right at first light on Exchange Street, left at next light on Roosevelt Ave. Slater Mill is on the left past Pawtucket City Hall.

Founders' Day

We will observe Founders' Day at First Baptist Church in America, which is located at 75 North Main Street, Providence, Rhode Island. Directions: From Providence, take Route 195 East to Route 114 South to Barrington; left at first light at the "White Church" onto Massasoit Avenue. Follow through to New Meadow Road and go right on New Meadow Road; first right is Meadowbrook Drive. Cashill home is on the left.

SATURDAY, JUNE 17, 2006 - 11:00 AM

Presentation by Ranger John McNiff on William Blackstone

Members and guests will meet at the Roger Williams National Memorial at 282 North Main Street, Providence, Rhode Island for a presentation by Ranger John McNiff on William Blackstone, early settler of Massachusetts and Rhode Island. Born March 5, 1595 in Durham County, England, Rev. William Blackstone was the first European to have settled in what is now Boston and lived in what is now Rhode Island. Ordained in the Church of England, Blackstone conducted the first Anglican services of record in Rhode Island, and his collection of books was probably the largest private library in the British colonies at the time. A picnic lunch and Annual Business Meeting will follow Ranger McNiff's presentation. Please pack your own lunch and bring a lawn chair or blanket to sit on for a picnic on the park grounds.

Directions to the Memorial: From Route 95 North, take the State Office exit; go straight across Orms Street at end of exit; turn left on Smith Street; turn right at bottom of hill onto Canal Street, then immediate left into Memorial's parking lot.

JOSEPH WILLIAMS' EPITAPH

Condensed by Elsie Bushnell Williams from "These Plantations" by J. Earl Clauson

Was Joseph Williams a Theosophist? If so, or if not, what is the significance of the epitaph on his gravestone in the family burying lot in Roger Williams Park? The idea that he may have been one occurs because an important item of Theosophist belief is reincarnation in some different form, and the epitaph runs as follows:

In King Philip's War he courageously went through/And the native Indians he bravely did subdue, / And now he's gone down to the grave and he will be no more/Until it please Almighty God his body to restore/Into some proper shape as He thinks fit to be, / Perhaps as a grain of wheat as Paul sets forth, you see.

There follows a reference to Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth. In the fifteenth chapter, verses 36, 37 and 38, he says: "That which thou sowest is not quickened except it die. And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat or of some other grain. But God givest it a body as it hath pleased him."

We take it that was what whoever thought up the lines which mark Joseph Williams' last resting place had in mind. Perhaps Joseph himself prepared the epitaph in anticipation of death. If so, they reflect unquestionably his own thoughts. But they seem rather more likely to have been assembled after his death, quite probably by his pastor. The belief in the resurrection of the body was out of fashion among the early settlers of Rhode Island. They seem not to have concerned themselves generally with what was going to happen to the mortal tenement. Our own idea is that Joseph took a naturalistic view of the matter, figuring that his flesh would promote other growths.

Joseph was born in December 1643, six months after Roger had sailed for England on his successful quest for the first charter. He was eight months old when his father first saw him after his triumphal return. There is one curious reference to him as a boy of 16 in a letter Roger wrote to his friend John Winthrop of Connecticut. He says: "My youngest son Joseph was troubled with a spice of epilepsy. We used some remedies, but it hath pleased God by his taking of tobacco perfectly as we hope to cure him."

Joseph was 31, in the full strength of his manhood when he bravely did subdue the Indians in the great war. He held by gift from his father the Pawtuxet lands allotted to Roger, including the greater part of what is now included in the Park.

If Joseph had a touch of what later came to be known as Theosophy, he came by it legitimately. His father passed his whole life trying to sift truth from falsehood. No doubt in the course of his meditations, Roger gave a lot of thought to the fate of the body after death. Very likely he talked these matters over with his youngest son, Joseph.

Milking the cows where now Providence dwellers seek recreation in their beautiful Park, picking apples, ploughing and hoeing, Joseph would have had opportunity to think these matters over. He knew how a grain of wheat grows and the corn swells in the ear. In some such way as that, his body after death would live again. That's what we think his epitaph means. Any reader who wants to think otherwise may do so without written license.

GEORGE WIGHTMAN WILLIAMS December 15, 1921 - December 24, 2004

We regret the passing of Past President George Wightman Williams in December 2004. He was a long-time member of the Roger Williams Family Association, and served it in many ways.

George was born at Providence on 15 December 1921, an eleventh generation descendant of Roger Williams. He was educated in Providence schools, graduating from Brown University in the Class of 1942. He served in World War II as a Naval Officer on a submarine chaser, and later as Naval Aide in President Truman's White House. He left the Navy in 1952., and after working as a public radio executive and in advertising, he embarked on a new career, teaching classics at Providence Country Day School in East Providence, Rhode Island.

He retired in 1991. He was known at Providence Country Day for his excellence in teaching, his sterling guidance, and for his French poodle, who accompanied him everywhere -- even to class -- and answered only to commands in Latin.

George passed away on 24 December 2004 and we miss him, his quick wit, his love of people and his ability to charm us with a favorite narrative.

IN MEMORY OF SSG SCOTT C. ROSE Killed in Action at Tikrit, Iraq 7 November 2003

We were saddened to learn of the death in Iraq of Scott C. Rose, SSG, husband and father of two of the descendants of Roger Williams. The report of Scott's death came to us from his father, Lt. Col. Alfred E. Rose of Fayetteville, North Carolina.

Scott is survived by his wife, Michele Denise (Basso) Rose, who was born at Springfield, Vermont, daughter of Albert Edmund and Anne Elizabeth (Birmingham) Basso; and a daughter, Meghan Louise Rose, born at Ft. Campbell, Kentucky 31 July 2003. Michele is an eleventh generation descendant of Roger Williams, and Meghan a twelfth generation descendant:

Scott Christopher Rose was born at Attleboro, Bristol County, Massachusetts 2 March 1973, and died at Tikrit, Iraq 7 November 2003 when he was shot down by a SA16 Missile, flying a UH-60 Blackhawk 26431. He was the son of Lt. Col. Alfred E. And Karen (Burgess) Rose. Scott and Michele were married at Mendon, Vermont.

We send our deepest sympathy to Scott's family and will keep in good care the family material sent to us by his father, Alfred E. Rose.
