



We are so used to the principle that a man may think as he pleases and hold such religious opinions as he chooses, that we are not able to comprehend conditions under which a man dare not call his soul his own. Yet, every settler of Rhode Island was a refugee and an outcast from Massachusetts; refugee, because he was not allowed to express opinions contrary to the official views of the magistrates and elders of the church; outcast, because Massachusetts feared to let anyone remain within her borders who dared to speak out against the State.

Roger Williams dared to speak, and was banished, but his little settlement at Providence, the rallying point for believers in soul liberty, became a cornerstone of our liberties.

THE GUIDE POSTS OF HISTORY BY WILLIAM GREENE ROELKER

In June 1942, as RWFA was preparing for its 50th Annual Meeting, it was noted that "war conditions" would "make it hard for some to attend." A mere seven months earlier, America had experienced the horrors of the attack on our forces at Pearl Harbor, resulting in our nation going to war.

In June 2019 we commemorated the 75th anniversary of D-Day and the monumental cost of fighting that war. It seems an appropriate time to share a reprint of the feature article from our 1942 RWFA Bulletin.

In times of stress men naturally turn to the past for help in solving the problems of today. In the generation before us men have survived great crises; we seek to find the stones upon which they built. They were men, not unlike ourselves, however different the conditions of life may have been then. It is safe to assume that the principles which enabled them to survive are still valid for us.

If history teaches no other lesson, it demonstrates that our forefathers succeeded against great odds. Can there be any doubt that if we build on their foundations we, too, shall succeed?

Somewhat belatedly, thinking people have become aware that the principles for which we now fight were expressed in America for the first time by Roger Williams.

"This is a war," recently said the Charlestown News Courier, "for the right for every man to be a rebel, in the name of God, against earthly ambition, greed for land and loot, against creatures of common clay who call themselves 'the State."

The authoritarian Axis powers are close kin to the "Divine-Right-of-Kings" rulers of England and in some respects similar to the theoracy of Massachusetts Bay, against both of which Roger Williams rebelled.

In their day, each of these governments held that man exists for the State which had the right to control even a man's opinions. Roger Williams established the American principle that the State exists for the individual who is free to express any opinion. The two positions are the opposite poles of thought.

Inevitably, the conflict began when the first man questioned the authority of anyone to do his thinking for him. But it remained for Roger Williams to establish a State based upon the principle that government should have authority "only in civil things."
