

We are pleased to announce the 150th Anniversary of Roger Williams Park! In 1871 Betsey Williams, descendant of Roger, bequeathed over 100 acres to the City of Providence for the Park and additional funds to erect a statue of Roger Williams there. The park has since quadrupled in size and has undergone many wonderful improvements. The park's birthday will be commemorated on Sunday, October 30th with an all-day event. For our members and their guests, the day will begin with a special morning service at the First Baptist Church in America, followed by a complimentary luncheon at the Roger Williams Park Casino. Various activities hosted by the Roger Williams Park Conservancy, TEN31 Productions, and the Association will follow, including lectures, colonial music, presentations on Roger Williams, Betsey Williams, and Conanicus, and tours of the Victorian Rose Gardens, the Williams Family Cemetery, Betsey Williams Cottage, and Roger Williams Statue. The day will be capped by a chorus of "Happy Birthday" and birthday cake. October 30th will be a perfect opportunity to reunite with our Roger Williams family members and pose for group photos in the park as our family members have traditionally done for many decades. Lineal descendants of Roger Williams and their spouses are eligible to join the Roger Williams Family Association. To request an application, please contact our Registrar or our Corresponding Secretary. Contact information is available on the back cover of this Bulletin. Application forms are also available on our web site. Please note that references are REQUIRED. Incomplete applications will be returned.

Membership dues and fees for Standard and Associate Memberships are as follows:

Originally, the city refused to accept the property, as it was 'too far' from where people lived. Shortly thereafter, the trolley line was expanded to include Elmwood Avenue. With that, the city accepted the bequest. The monument to Roger Williams next to the Betsey Williams cottage was dedicated on October 16, 1877, with 20,000 people in attendance.

In the 1930s, with the commemoration for the 300th anniversary of the founding of Rhode Island approaching, even more attention was focused on Roger Williams. Roger Williams Spring Park (now the Hahn Memorial) and a small monument were dedicated along North Main Street in the mid-1930s. The monument with a statue of Roger, which is also his final resting place, was finally placed in Prospect Park in 1939.

In the 1950s, US Senator Theodore Francis Greene began a push for national recognition of Roger Williams and his work. These efforts were taken up by his successor in the US Senate, Claiborne Pell. Roger Williams National Memorial was established by Congress in October 1965 to commemorate Williams' "outstanding contributions to the development of the principles of freedom in this country." The memorial, a 4.5 acre urban greenspace located at the foot of College Hill in downtown Providence, includes a freshwater spring which was the center of the settlement of Providence founded by Williams in 1636. It is on this site that Williams, through word and action, fought for the ideal that religion be entirely separate from the state and that it should be a matter of individual conscience. Along with that, the state did not get its authority from God, but from the consent of the people. It was a remarkable journey that brought Williams to what is now the capital of Rhode Island and to where he put his beliefs into practice, giving "shelter for persons distressed of conscience."

This 4.5-acre memorial has changed quite a bit from its origins in 1965. At first the area was a vacant lot, the product of urban renewal. The landscape you can see today was designed by Albert Veri and Associates and put into place in 1984. Mr. Veri stated that he wished the place to be an 'urban oasis, a contemplative grove' where people could come, take a break from the urban bustle around them and contemplate the ideas and ideals of Roger Williams. When visiting the site in 2010, Mr. Veri said that the design had turned out just as he had seen it in his mind.

There is a small visitors center for the memorial at the corner of North Main and Smith Streets. In the center is a short, 5-minute video on the life of Roger Williams. There is also an exhibit demonstrating how Roger's 'New and dangerous opinions,' the crime for which he was tossed out of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, are still relevant for all of us throughout the world today.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 15, 2022 - 1:00 PM BIENNIAL TRIPTO MARGARET'S ROCK

Following his banishment from Salem in January 1636, and suffering from illness, Roger Williams headed to Sowams (now Warren) where Margaret, a Wampanoag medicine woman, nursed him back to health in a lean-to shelter at Massasoit's winter camp. This is the only remaining abode in the Providence area whose walls Roger actually touched. A hike of approx. 500 yards is required. Bring a folding chair and packed lunch for a brief meeting afterwards.

Directions: From Providence, take I-195 toward Swansea and Fall River; take the Rt. 136 exit and travel south 1.7 miles; after crossing into RI, turn left onto Birch Swamp Rd; continue for 0.3 miles where road takes a 90 degree turn, and go straight onto the dirt road (sign "Windswept Farm"; DO NOT turn right into the drive to the Old Chase Farm). We will assemble on this dirt road, drive to within several hundred yards, and hike up to the rock from there.

Parking can be difficult, so plan travel time accordingly.

ROGER WILLIAMS' PARKS

Roger Williams was a passionate Christian minister who is widely recognized as the founding figure for the state of Rhode Island. In so doing, he established one of the very first places based on the absolute separation of church and state. He did this, not because religion was unimportant, but because it was *too* important to be tied to something as tied to this world as government. In doing so he also established one of the very first places where the people were the foundation of civil government. These ideals of religious liberty and secular government were written into the founding documents of the United States.

Ironically, by the end of his own lifetime, Williams was pretty much an afterthought for the people of Providence. The official records state that he died and was buried on his own property sometime between January and March 1683. Sometime between January and March!

Decades later, as English colonies in America grew more and more disheartened with colonial rule, many of Williams' ideals took center stage. Locke, Rousseau, Jefferson, and Madison all echoed Williams when writing on liberty and freedom.

After independence, Rhode Island's influence grew as it became the cornerstone of industrialization. Slater Mill and all the other mills that followed, and the Blackstone Canal, brought economic prosperity to Providence. With that prosperity, leading families in Rhode Island began to look back at their origins and sought to record and commemorate Rhode Island's origin story. The work of Roger Williams was once again coming to the forefront of history.

By the mid-19th century, an effort was made to commemorate Williams and his work. But plans for a memorial statue to Williams at Prospect Park on Providence's east side were put on hold by the outbreak of the Civil War. After the war, the focus shifted to memorializing the efforts and sacrifices of the soldiers and sailors from the recent conflict.

It wasn't until the passing of Betsey Williams, the great-great-great granddaughter of Roger Williams, in 1871 that a tangible memorial to Williams was created. The Roger Williams Park and Zoo was created on land that had belonged to the Williams family, going back to Roger's youngest son Joseph. When Betsey Williams died in 1871, she willed her property, 102 acres, to the city of Providence to be used for the public good, along with the stipulation that the city would be required to create a monument for her famous ancestor.
