HISTORIC SMITH'S CASTLE IN COCUMSCUSSOC

This historic building stands on the site of a trading post owned by Roger Williams, the founder of Rhode Island, a little north of Wickford, R. I. In order to raise money for a journey to England to settle difficulties with the charter of the Colony, Roger Williams sold it to Richard Smith in 1651, where Smith elected to put up his "English Home".

In 1676 Indians burned the trading post and garrison house, but Richard Smith, Jr. erected in 1680, partly from material of the old building, the house which stands today a Cocumscossoc Farm, built nearly a centry before the Declaration of Independence was signed. In those days of Indian massacres a large, fortified dwelling was called a castle.

The walls of this house are thick, of stud construction and the chimney has a great fireplace in the back or kitchen ell. The chimney which is of brick was rebuilt between 1735 and 1740 to replace the old one, but it follows the style of an earlier day with its oven in the back wall and large proportioned wings. The house is unique and with its furnishings show how our forefathers lived, not only in the primitive and perilous 1700's but also in the more comfortable and prosperous 1800's. It contains many priceless antiques of both these periods including a chair owned and used by Roger Williams. It was the great house of this region and many illustrious persons stayed here — among them Benjamin Franklin, Gen. Lafayette, Gen. Nathaniel Greene of Revolutionary War fame, and Roger Williams.

On the grounds is the mass grave of 40 Colonial soldiers killed in 1673 in the Great Swamp Fight with the Indians.

This important and fascinating building is preserved as a living museum.

ROGER WILLIAMS' WATCH

The silver watch carried by Roger Williams was placed on exhibition in Providence in 1936 as a feature of the opening ceremony of the 300th year of the settlement of Rhode Island. It was an inch and a quarter thick, two and one-eighths inches in diameter, fully 10 ounces in weight with a swinging pedulum and a device that changes every 24 hours to mark the day of the month. This watch, in 1936 still kept good time and was owned by H. Russell Drowne, Jr. of New York. Even the works are of gilt, elaborately decorated. The pendulum is a curiosity, seldom seen even in the oldest time pieces. The spring originally was wound with a catgut cord, but about a century or so ago was replaced by a fine chain. It is wound by a separate key about an inch long, inserted in a slot in the back. Hands of carved gold point to hours in letters and to minutes in numerals. Behind a thick rock crystal glass is the face of the watch in silver, ornamented in the center with a Cupid blowing a bugle and following a stag pursued by a hound. The name of the maker is engraved on the face. Below this is the small opening through which may be seen a rotating disc telling the day of the month. Just when or where Roger Williams came into possession of the watch is not known although family documents and records proved he once owned it. It would be interesting to know the whereabouts of this watch at this time.
