FOLLOWING ROGER WILLIAMS

Let us follow the course of Roger Williams after he landed from the ship Lyon in Boston Harbor, New England, at the age of 27 after a voyage of 37 days; five years after he had graduated from Pembroke College, England as an ordained minister of the Established Church of England, but from which he dissented and separated because of religious persecution and came to the New World where he could live and profess unmolested the freedom of religious thought that he believed the right of every individual.

Refusing a church in Boston because he "durst not officiate to an unseparated people" he was welcomed to Salem, but was far in advance of the views of the colonial authorities, whose freedom to worship was according to their particular ways and he clashed with those ideas practiced by the rulers of the Colony.

Feeling more liberal principles were practiced in Plymouth and not under Boston jurisdiction, he left Salem and spent two years there, gaining life long friendship with many of the best minds in the Colony and of the sachems of the Indian tribes located there where he studied their Indian character and language.

Again he returned to Salem where many of his friends followed. But in two more years the Boston authorities commenced another course of persecution against the church of Roger Williams, so he spent fourteen weeks in exile and obtained a grant from the Wampanoag Sachem, Massasoit, of lands on the east side of the Seekonk River where his wife and faithful followers joined him.

After starting to build their houses and plant fields they were warned by Gov. Winslow that they were on Bay Colony land and were forced to seek homes across the Seekonk River on uncontested ground. A marker on a spring on Roger Williams Avenue in East Providence shows the spring and location of the start of this settlement which they were forced to abandon, but which now is a part of Rhode Island.

By canoe they crossed the river but the high forest crowned bluffs of sand and gravel had no desirable supply of fresh water so they continued down the west shore to Slate Rock where a small group of Indians greeted them with "What Cheer Netop." Continuing under the steep bluff they reached the open waters of Narragansett Bay and entered the "great salt river" which they followed, arriving at a series of flats and marshes toward the level of a sandy plain, near where two rivers met and where they found a beautiful cove, and a spring of fresh water, and ideal place for a settlement and safe from the land of persecution, which Roger Williams named "Providence." The settlement spread in all directions and collectively received the name of "Providence Plantations."
