Dear Cousins,

As your president for this year I am truly honored. I shall do my best.

We are saddened by the death of Stephen A. Greene Jr. our past president 1983 - 1986, who gave so much to the Roger Williams Family Association. A Tribute to Steve by our Chaplain George W. Williams appears in this bulletin. We dedicate the bulletin to the memory of Steve.

Welcome to you, the new members of the Roger Williams Family Association. We congratulate you for your interest in keeping alive the memory of our common ancestor, Roger Williams, whose beliefs have contributed to our American Democracy that we all enjoy today.

A most interesting book, "What Cheer, Netop!", has been received from the Haffenreffer Museum. It is composed of selections of excerpts from "A Key Into the Language of America" by Roger Williams, and was transcribed and edited by Hadassah Davis. The publisher is the Haffenreffer Museum of Anthropology, Brown University, Bristol, R.I.

Very soon the Rhode Island Historical Society will present "The Correspondence of Roger Williams", Glenn W. LaFantasie, editor. There are two volumes, the first 1629 - 1653 and the second 1654 - 1682. These are letters by or to Roger Williams from the time that he was a Chaplain in England to the time of his death in New England.

Each member of the Roger Williams Family Association will receive an announcement of the publication. When the book is presented in the Spring, the Seventeenth Century Colonial Dames and Roger Williams Family Association members will be hosts.

An update of the inventory of possessions of the Roger Williams Family Association will be made this year.

It is also time to review the by-laws of the Association. Your suggestions will be most welcome.

We are considering as our contribution to the preservation of early Providence records relating to Roger Williams, to offer to restore a document for the City of Providence Archives. Carol Pace, City Archivist, presented a valuable and interesting program showing many early documents, most of which are in need of preservation if they are to survive.

While the progress of the Roger Williams Lineage Book is rather slow, we are happy to report that the Mercy Williams Winsor portion has been published by Mr. Kay Moore, and that the Mercy Williams Waterman section, now complete, is the contribution of Mrs. Everett White. Our congratulations to them for their excellent work. We are looking forward to hearing that other branches of the family genealogy will be finished in the near future.

In May, Mrs. Robert Corbit (Birdie), an artist and one of our members, will exhibit her water colors relating to Roger Williams at the First Baptist Church in America at Waterman Street and North Main Street. On Forefather's Day, May 15th, we will have an opportunity to see this fine exhibit.

We have received a gift of a framed illuminated illustration of the Williams family seal from Mr. Merrick Taylor Jackson of Ossining, N.Y. In his letter he says "Ever since it has been drawn in the late twenties by an artist friend of mine, it has graced some interior wall in a succession of quarters. Now that I am, shall we say, reduced to something small, I want it to be or should I say remain a part of the family. I hope others may have a chance to see it". We are delighted with Mr. Jackson's thoughtful gift to the Association.

In this bulletin we have reproduced a letter of Roger Williams to John Winthrop Jr. written from Mr. Richard Smiths June 3, 1675. (The site with it's later house is now known as "Smith's Castle" or "Cocumcussoc". The house is open to the public as a museum and is near Wickford, R.I.)

We thought that you would like to see the letter in the hand writing of Roger Williams. A transcript is included so that you may read the letter more easily.

We look forward to a good year for the Association and urge all who can to attend our meetings.

TRANSCRIPTION OF ROGER WILLIAMS LETTER

TO JOHN WINTHROP, JR., GOVERNOR OF CONNECTICUT

From M^r Richard Smiths June 3 1675 (ut vulgo) S^r M^r Smith being at Newport I am occasioned to present my old and constant love & respect as also M^r Smiths great thanks & service to you S^r M^r Smith gave me 2 letters the one from M^r Fitch y^e other from M^r John Mason praying me (according to y^e Contents of y^e Letters) to Enquire of Mawsup (now calld Canounicus) whether Onkas has stired him up against y^e Wunnashowatuckowogs to kill them & S^r a fortnightsince I went to Cawnownicus his house but he was gone 12 mile of I sought him again yesterday & found him 5 mile from his house I shewd him y^e Letters I used also Your honrd Name & y^e names of y^e honrd assistants both concerning y^e killing of y^e English Cattell in these parts as also concerning their Cariage toward y^e Wunnashowatuckoogs who are respected by Your Selves.

S^r Caunounicus & other Sachims & his Councell profess they will be careful of y^e English & their Cattell among them Also y^e they will shew respect to those Showatuks for yo^r Sake & in purticular (w^{ch} answers Mr. Fitch & Mr. Masons Letters) Caunounicus utterly denies y^e Onkas ever solicited him to kill or molest those Showatuks Withall he added 2 Reasons First y^e it is not credible y^e since Onkas kild his Brother Miantunnomu (He Cawnownicus) should be solicited by Onkas in such a Business or y^e he should gratifie Onkas desires so 2 Both himselfe & Nanawtunnu (Miantunnomus youagest very hopeful Sparke) desire Earnestly y^e Tatuphosuwut Onkas his Son who hath killed a Wiyors (or Sachim) one of their Cousins may Suffer impartially (as now y^e English have dealt with y^e 3 Indians w^{ch} killed John Sossimon Also they praid me to add y^e yor Selve are not ignorant of Onkas his many fowle practices & how he treacherously sent an head (or heads) of the Quinhticut Indians to y^e Mauquawogs & would send y^{or} Heads also as presents if he could Come at them S^r Nanawtunnu added this Argument for in partialitie toward Tatuphosuit I am (said he) my Father Miantunnomues Son as Tatuphosuit is to Onkas If there should partialtie by shewd to him & y^e Money should but out mens lives or y^e one of his men should die for him then all we young Sachims shall have a Temptation Laid before us to kill and murder etc. in y^e hope of y^e like Impunitie

It is true y^e Phillip (fearing apprehension) stood upon his Guard with his armed Barbarians Taunton Swansie Rehoboth & Providence stood upon ours but praised be God y^e storms is over Phillip is strongly suspected but y^e honrd Court at Plymouth (as we heare) not having Evidence Sufficient let matters Sleepe & y^e Countrey be in quiet etc. S^r I constantly think of you & send up one Remembrance to Heaven for you & a groan from my Selve for my Selve when I pass by *Elizabeths Spring Here is y^e Spring Say I (with a Sigh) but where is Elizabeth My Charity answers she is gone to y^e Eternal Spring & Fountain of Living Waters oh S^r I beseech y^e Father of Mercies & Spriritis to Preserve Y^{or} precious Soule in Life (Long & Long)

*The Spring so called from Gov. Winthrop's Lady named Elizabeth Drinking at it as she passd to Boston

Elizabeth's Spring, mentioned by Roger Williams in his letter to John Winthrop Jr., Governor of Connecticut is at the head of Greenwich Cove Located on Forge Road a short distance from the Old Post Road in the City of Warwick, R.I. In 1884 Dr. James H. Eldredge, a much respected and beloved physician and civic leader in East Greenwich, placed a granite mill stone over Elizabeths Spring. A marble tablet in the center bears this inscription: "Elizabeth Spring, so called from Mistress Elizabeth Winthrop drinking at it in her travels up to Conecticut in ye beginning of ye country as early as 1645."

From Mr. Richard Smith Junr. of the City (at night)
Mr. Smith being at Newport of an occasion to present

house, but he was gone, I sought him

Your son & name & y^e names of y^e honorable
Councils both concerning y^e killing of y^e English
Cattell in these parts, as also concerning y^e by
Carriage toward y^e Wannashoatuckoags
are respected by y^e selves
Canonics & other Sachins of his Council pro-
fess they will be careful of y^e English & their
Cattell among them. Also y^t they will show
respect to y^e Showatuck for y^e sake
of y^e particular w^{ch} answers in Gitch & in
Masons letters (and in y^e vellely shewes y^t
Uncas ever solicited him to kill or hurt
these showatuck. Withall he adds 2 Reasons
first y^t it is not credit y^t since Uncas killed
his Brother Martuanoan, the Canonics
should be solicited by Uncas in such a Bu-
sines, or y^t he should gratifie Uncas desire of
2 Both himselfe & Martuanoan (the Canonics
youngest very hopeful sprake) desire. Ever with y^e
Tatupowant Uncas his son who hath killed

a Niyoro (or Sachin) one of these Cousins, may suffer
 in partially, (as you y^e English have dealt with
 Indians, last kind - John Sashiman. Also they
 said me to add, y^e y^e selfe are not ignorant
 of Andes. In many fish practices & then he
 especially sent a head (or heads) of the
 white, Indians to y^e Nauquaog, & words
 sent y^e heads also as presents if he could
 come at them. S^r Wapianawitine added this
 Argument for impartialitie toward Tatup
 Simit. I am (said he) my Father Nianawano
 was Son of Tatup Simit is, to be par: if
 there should be partialitie, he should be him
 & y^e money should be y^e y^e mess or y^e
 one of his Men should die for him, then all
 the young Sachims shall have a Temptation
 to goe before or to kill & murder in y^e hope
 of y^e like forgiveness
 I have y^e killing (fearing apprehension)
 stood upon his Guard with his friend Barba
 rian, Tuanton, Swannie, Rehoboth & Grovi
 chon stood upon every but praid to God y^e
 Stomach; our killing is strongly suspected
 but y^e Court at Plymouth (as we
 hear) not having Evidence sufficient to mat
 ter these y^e Country, he is sweet &
 I constantly think of you & send you our
 Remembrance to thaven for you, & a gown
 from my selfe for my selfe, when I pass
 y^e this all the Spring, there y^e Spring day
 (with a slight) but as he y^e Elizabeth
 My Charity answers she is gone to y^e Eden
 mal. Spring & Fountain of Living waters. I
 send y^e seed y^e Father of Mercies & Spirits to
 preserve y^e precious Soule. The life Long & Long.

IN MEMORIAM - STEPHEN A. GREENE, JR. - 1926-1987

Stephen A. Greene, Jr., our immediate past president, was a warm, outgoing, enthusiastic, active and dynamic human being first and foremost. As a youth, his mother, Dorothy, tells us, he early showed thoughtfulness toward others, both family and friends, peers and seniors in age. She also told us about his adolescent interest in photography. All of the Family Association who were fortunate enough to know him - even though only casually perhaps - experienced his consideration, warmth and humor.

Stephen, a man of many facets, was active in patriotic organizations and educational endeavors for many, many years. His friends and acquaintances were legion.

In the very busy year of 1986, Rhode Island's celebration of the 350th year of its founding, Stephen ably represented the Family Association with grace, effective presence and, withal, with a modesty and lack of ostentation that brought new lustre, recognition and respect to the Association. The Association was led to a more active participation in Rhode Island affairs than it had evidenced in some fifty years... indeed, since Rhode Island's and Providence's tercentenary observances in 1936. And president though he was, it was he who with a practiced photographer's eye often caught many Family Association events on film for the record or for "cousins" to whom he would send them. Without a doubt, Steve was well called to his term that embraced Rhode Island's 350th!

In the short time of the writer's life, Stephen Greene was a singularly outstanding Association president. We were indeed blessed with his leadership and most of all with the man himself.

After saving the Republic, the great Cicero once said to the Roman populace, "Nihil me mutum potest delectare" - "Nothing mute, such as a statue, can delight me" - "Memoria vestrae, Quirites, nostrae res aleatur" - "In your memory, fellow Romans, my deeds will be nourished." So indeed it is with our late president, Stephen: his monuments are not of stone or bronze, but in our memories of him and... Cicero again... "sermonibus crescent" - "in your conversations my deeds will grow."

You were a noble, spirited, and, yes, as the days grew short, courageous soul, Steve. Thank you, Stephen, from all of us, your cousins near and far.

Requiescas in pace et lux aeterna tibi affulgeat... May you rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon you.
